
Africa: Why Economists Get It Wrong

Bio: Jerven has a Ph.D. in Economic History from the London School of Economics. He is also the author of the book *Poor Numbers: How We Are Misled by African Development Statistics and What to Do About It* (Cornell University Press, 2013). He has since published a more detailed study of what happened to the economic growth evidence in Botswana, Kenya, Tanzania, and Zambia from 1965 to 1995 with Oxford University Press. He has also edited two volumes with Routledge: Measuring African Development: Past and Present and Statistical Tragedy in Africa?: Evaluating the Database for African Economic Development. In his current research 'A world that counts?,' Jerven studies the way that numbers and quantification shapes our knowledge and decisions in international development.
